an hour or two each month maintaining our membership list, or joining the Archaeology Weekend committee, we can use your help.

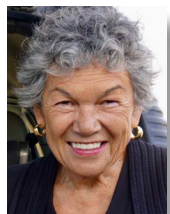

Fees waived for the Rock Art Conservation Management Workshop slated for Nov. 9 & 10

Only a few spaces remain for popular two-day class by Jeremy Freeman

California State Parks and Colorado Desert Archaeology Society will host a special two-day workshop on Rock Art Conservation Management featuring renowned archaeologist **Jeremy Freeman on Nov. 9 and 10.**

Saturday's class will be a full day in the classroom and cover conservation concerns and agents of deterioration of rock art sites. On Sunday, you will go out in the field to collect conservation management data at an archaeological site.

During both days, discussions will include how to complete a conservation management condition assessment, assess the stability of the rock art support, document

transformational processes affecting the integrity of the panel, collect climatic data, monitor color, analyze the moisture content of the support, collect surface temperature and temperature variation, and use microscopic analysis. Jeremy will also cover acceptable treatment techniques, diachronic monitoring, and developing a conservation management plan.

VIRGINIA PERRINE

The applause was immediate and very loud for Virginia Perrine, longtime Borrego resident and extraordinary CDAS volunteer. Virginia had just been named the inaugural recipient of the “Archy Award” by Robin Connors and Hayley Elsken at the recent CDAS kick-off meeting.

Virginia was honored for putting in “effort and heart in making our archaeology program viable and vibrant,” said Robin. And she has been doing just that for decades.

Virginia has been an active site steward, known by her colleagues for her exceptional observation skills in the field, as well as her fortitude.

“We once went to East Mesa to check out a looted site and lost the trail. We had Virginia with us and we had to bushwhack back to the road. She was a real trooper!” said Robin.

Virginia has participated in multiple surveys, including the 2012 Culp Valley

fire survey, and led tours from the Visitor Center to the BARC during Archaeology Weekend.

Virginia can be seen at virtually every CDAS event, always helping with whatever needs to be done. She has been instrumental in securing donations from local merchants for every CDAS fundraising auction.

For years, Virginia has participated in the Breast Cancer and MS 5K fundraising events in Southern California. She also assists the Borrego Springs Chamber of Commerce at their Sundowner events.

Virginia first came to Borrego in 1961, nearly 60 years ago. She worked as a waitress at La Casa Del Zorro when it was owned by the Copley family — and at the Desert Club in 1963, which is now the UCI Steele/Burnand Desert Research Center. Virginia has also been Borrego Springs’ Avon lady for 55 years.

So there is much we could share regarding Virginia, but where does one begin? For me, as a former steering committee member, one instance comes to mind. CDAS had awarded a gift of appreciation to Virginia for exemplary service during our annual silent-auction fundraiser. She had been relentless in contacting local business for donations.

For that effort, she received a \$50 certificate at Kendall’s Cafe, where she went often. However, being Virginia, she waited until all the steering committee members were available and then took us all to lunch...on her. It’s always about giving back and community service when you get to hang out with Virginia!

Another time as a site-steward team, Virginia, Julie Nyssen and I were at our site. It was hot that day, so Virginia got back to the car early, opened up all the doors, lay down and napped. When she awoke, she was sharing the shade with a large diamond-back rattlesnake. Not having space to move, she stayed put where she was, captive until it slid away.

As site stewards, we were blessed because Virginia had the “eye.” She missed nothing. She saw every footprint, every sherd. It was her gift in return for not having to fill out paperwork. She loved the field part, just not filling out forms. Together we were a team, again serving others.

Another time at our site, she returned to the car early. It was locked, so she sat in the shade of the back wheel and laid her camera on top of the tire, out of the sun. It wasn’t till later that night, when we were already back in town, that she discovered she had no camera. I got a frantic call: Could I drive her out the next morning to search for whatever might be left of it? That morning as I prepared to leave, she called again — this time to tell me that some nice man had found her camera lying in the road, brought it out and hid it next to the call box on the highway. Virginia had slipped an address label with her phone number inside the camera case some time ago.

We drove out and found the camera intact. She was just happy to have pictures of her family and friends back, because that was more important than an old camera anyway.

It was never dull with Virginia...what a privilege to share good remembrances.

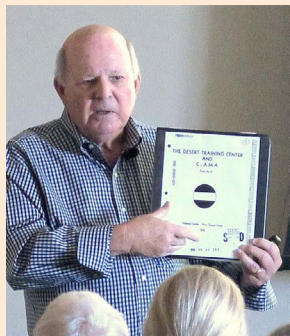

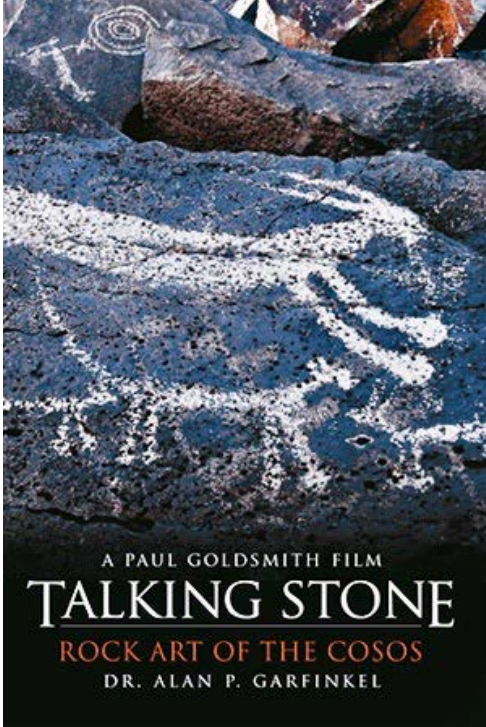
For nearly two hours, a hushed audience of more than 100 listened intently to noted educator and historian Sidney Burks talk about the military history of the Salton Sea and Borrego Valley.

Held in the spacious, high-tech community room of the new branch library, the much-anticipated event was richly illustrated with vintage photos and illustrations. Burks, through years of extensive and thorough research, discussed how the surrounding desert and Salton Sea provided critical training ground for military operations before, during and after WWII. He also persuasively debunked the rumor that General Patton was ever based here, and answered questions from the audience about mysterious structures and items that were left behind.

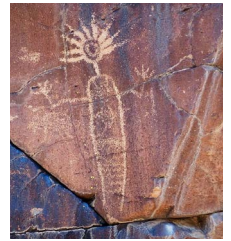
Rock art video scheduled for monthly program series

The acclaimed video by Dr. Alan Garfinkel, “Talking Stone: Rock Art of the Cosos,” will be shown in the ABDSP Visitors Center on Friday, Nov. 15 at 11 a.m. All rock art enthusiasts are encouraged to attend.

About the video: “Hidden away in the canyons of a top secret military base on the edge of the Mojave Desert is the largest concentration of rock art in North America. Created over thousands of years by a now vanished culture, it represents the oldest art in California. TALKING STONE explores the remote canyons and mysteries surrounding these amazing images. The leading expert on the rock art of the Cosos, Dr. Alan P. Garfinkel, has teamed up with the accomplished film maker Paul Goldsmith ASC, to explore and explain this ancient and elegant rock art.”

Better Impact

Better Impact categories and what they mean:

Trying to input hours into Better Impact, but not sure what activity category to put them under? Here are descriptions of each category and examples:

Archaeology CDAS:

Includes attending park-sanctioned CDAS meetings, planning CDAS meetings (annual and Welcome Back), helping with CDAS trainings for new members, planning CDAS educational events (monthly talks, Archaeology Weekend, field trips, etc.), etc. This does not include CDAS gatherings at members’ houses; these are social events and not part of official volunteer hours.

Archaeology CDAS Training and Education:

Attending trainings and education events to fulfill yearly training requirements. This could include Continuing Education classes, lectures sponsored by CDAS or even archaeological lectures attended outside of CDAS (though the lectures should have a nexus to Colorado Desert.)

Archaeology Field Work:

This is scheduled fieldwork with the Associate State Archaeologists. This will include surveys, site visits, site updates, etc. This may also include surveys and site updates led by experienced volunteers.

Archaeology Lab Data Entry- Scheduled:

This is for Tuesday Lab days.

Archaeology Lab Data Entry- Unscheduled:

This activity should be used for occasions when people come in to do lab work on non-lab days or work on lab work at home. Lab work at home may include, finishing photo logs and site notes from fieldwork, completing site forms, doing computer work related to the BARC collections, etc.

Archaeology Library:

This activity includes watching over the library when it is open to the public, re-shelving books, adding new books to the catalogue, etc.

Archaeology Site Stewardship:

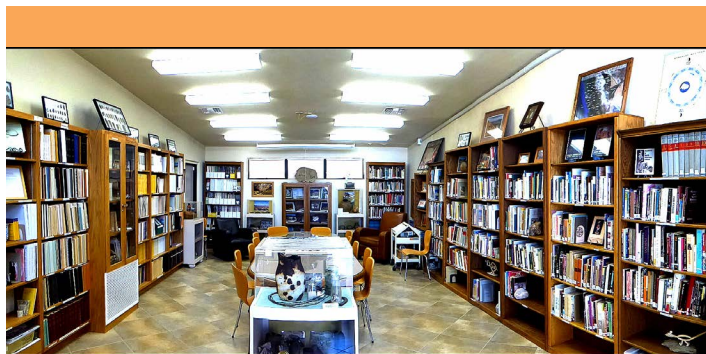
This includes hours spent visiting assigned archaeological site and hours spent creating site steward reports. It can also include any hours spent setting stewards up with new sites, organizing site steward reports, etc.

Archaeology Public Outreach:

This includes hours dedicated to educating the public about the park, the volunteer program, and cultural resources. Examples of when to use this category are leading hikes to approved archaeological sites, giving BARC tours, working information tables at events, etc.
